Y is the Youth who had all he could hold;

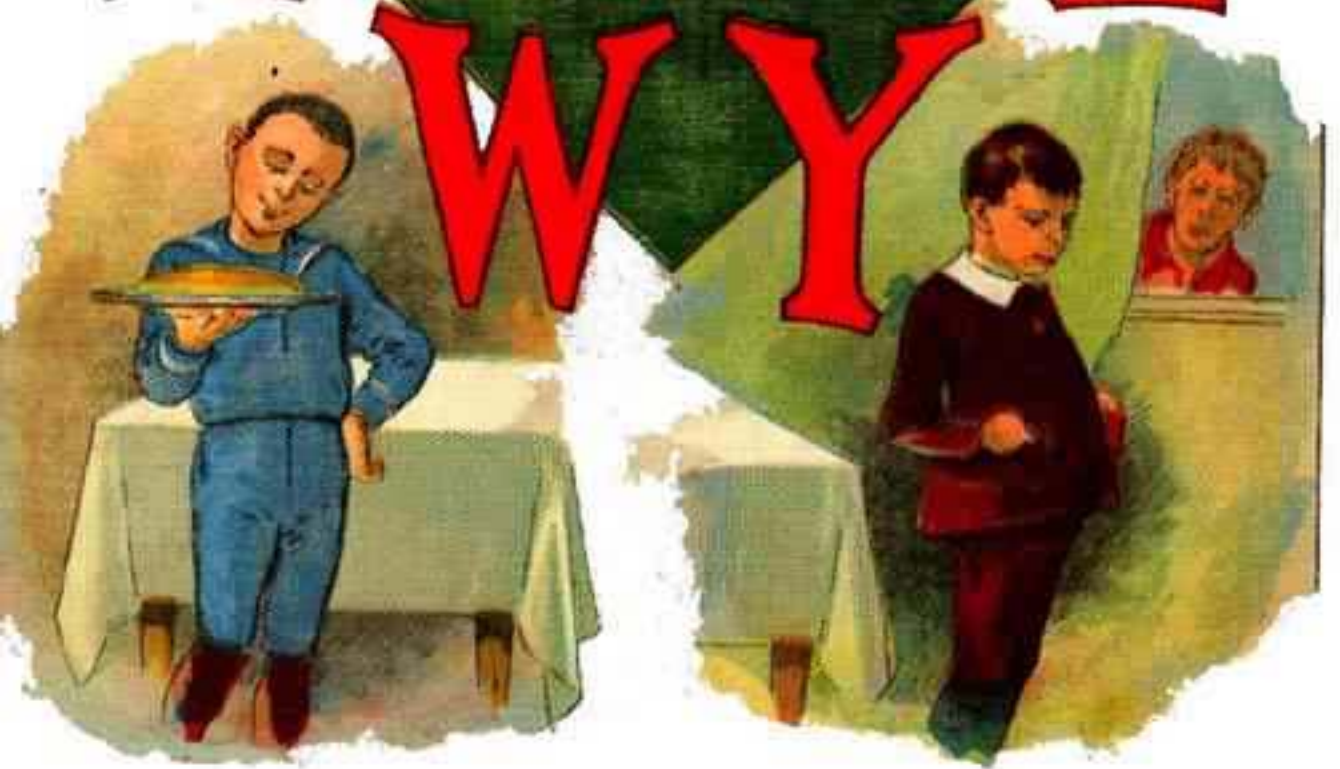
Z is for Zero—left out in the cold.
