

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### Introduction

What is "funny?" Literary critics, philosophers, psychologists, and social commentators have struggled for a definition since the ancients tackled the question. Although there have been as many theories as people who advanced them, several of them provide a useful overview:

The first variety of humor that we encounter in life is referred to as the humor of the forbidden, an elegant way of saying "potty jokes." Kids are taught that jokes about bodily functions are "no-no's" in polite society (whatever "polite society" now means), as is sex when they learn the facts of life. To assert their independence as well as to get a sure-fire laugh from playmates, children joke about things that they've been told not to talk about. This preoccupation with "naughty" themes continues throughout life, which accounts for adult humor's popularity and enduring appeal.

Although we feel a kind of personal empowerment when we violate such social codes, that's not what's meant by "humor of superiority." That phrase refers to the joke-teller, and by implication the audience, feeling intellectually or morally better than the joke's subject, whether the butt of the joke is a nationality or ethnic group, a certain class or group (e.g., dumb blondes), or a figment of the imagination ("Yo' Mama"). You and I would never be so stupid as the person in the joke, and that's largely why we find it so funny.

Superiority humor raises the issue of taste and/or decency, which we might as well address right now. Putting someone down only on the strength of race, religion, or national origin is in several senses a cheap shot. However, such jokes and comments are widespread, and truth be told, they can also be very funny. Since the purpose of this book is to enshrine—if that's the right word—funny things that people have said, we made a decision not to exclude those kinds of jokes. However, you'll find nothing patently offensive.

One person's sense of superiority is another's effort at survival, and many ethnic groups view put-downs or at least self-deprecating jokes as a way to keep some semblance of balance in a brutally unfunny world. Many jokes are intended for only the group in question and include the use of words that would be termed offensive epithets if used by an outsider. Others poke fun somewhat more gently at oppressors, such as the Native American jibe that "When Columbus landed, one Native American turned to another and said, 'Well, there goes the neighborhood."

Okay, that's when and how we laugh, but why do we laugh? What makes something funny? The wit of verbal gymnastics make us laugh in appreciation, a sort of vocal applause. When asked to distinguish between a misfortune and a calamity, British Prime Minister Benjamin Disraeli's reply that "If Mr. Gladstone fell into the Thames, that would be a misfortune; if someone pulled him out, that would be a calamity" is witty, and we respond to the verbal gymnastic with a chuckle (knowing about the fierce rivalry between Disraeli and Gladstone adds to our appreciation).

We also laugh at the unexpected, such as Woody Allen's observation that "Not only is there no God, but try getting a plumber on weekends." And at the absurd: Steven Wright's remark that "I knew these Siamese twins. They moved to England, so the other one could drive."

Whatever, however, why ever . . . we love to laugh, and for good reason. Humor is both emotionally and physically beneficial; *Reader's Digest* has a feature called "Laughter Is the Best Medicine," and doctors agree that it is. The ancients believed that our bodies were composed of four humors, or fluids, that had to be kept in balance to maintain health. One of the humors was sanguine, coming from the word for "blood" and now meaning cheerfully optimistic, a concept that's very close to being amused. Today's physicians understand that laughter lowers blood pressure, reduces stress, elevates mood, boosts the immune system, establishes social connections with others, and—best of all—makes us feel good.

Two parting pieces of advice: first, don't try to convince someone that a humorous item is indeed funny if the person doesn't find it so. It just won't work, for as Shakespeare put it, "a jest's prosperity lies in the ear of him that hears it, never in the tongue of him that makes it." Then too, never tell someone that he or she has no sense of humor. We can tolerate almost every kind of criticism or slur, but to be told we have no sense of humor is fighting words.

But not you—you have a terrific sense of humor. So read on, and laugh at these goodies. You'll love them. You can trust me. . . . I mean, have I ever lied to you before?

To all the people who suggested entries for this collection, I tip my fool's cap. Ditto to all the authors and entertainers who have made me laugh over the years. And to all the others, beginning with my father Martin Price and



#### **SPOONERISMS**

A transposition of initial letters, spoonerisms derive their name from the Reverend William Archibald Spooner (1844–1930), a British clergyman who became legendary for such slips of the tongue. Among his best known examples are "The lord is a shoving leopard" (instead of "loving shepherd"),"It is kisstomary to cuss the bride," and "Mardon me padam, this pie is occupewed. Can I sew you to another sheet?"

As a warden at Oxford University, he reprimanded a student for "fighting a liar in the quadrangle." To another student who "hissed my mystery lecture," Dr. Spooner said in disgust, "You have tasted two worms."

At a dinner at Oxford, Dr. Spooner proposed a toast that should have begun with "Let us raise our glasses and toast the dear Queen," but came out with instead, "Let us glaze our asses and toast the queer Dean."

At a naval review Dr. Spooner marveled at "this vast display of cattle ships and bruisers." Visiting a friend's country cottage, he complimented his host with, "You have a nosy little cook here."

Two years before his death, Dr. Spooner said he could recall only one such error, when the hymn "Conquering Kings Their Titles Take" came out "Kinkering Kongs."

Among celebrated Spoonerisms . . .

Newscaster Lowell Thomas presented British minister Sir Stafford Cripps as Sir Stifford **Crapps**.

At the inauguration of President Herbert Hoover, the radio newscaster proclaimed, "The next voice you hear will be that of our new president, Hoobert Heever." [The broadcaster was Harry Von Zell, later and better known as the announcer of *The Burns and Allen Show*.]
